## Nobel Student Panel

A panel of three students and one community member shared their experiences from the October 2017 Nobel Conference. The conference is an annual event at Gustavus Adolphus College in St. Peter, Minnesota and this year's theme was Reproductive Technology – How Far Do We Go. Sixty-six students, thirteen educators and eighteen community members from the Fox Cities made the trek.

The panel responded to four questions:

Q: What impressed you most about the conference?

A: Ethics and technology were both addressed. The speakers were superb: we don't hear Nobel laureates very often.

Q: Gene editing may eventually enable parents to alter the traits of their children. Make them taller or shorter with blue or brown eyes for example. Any concerns with this technology?

A: Who would have access to the technology? Would high income people gain the ability to create super humans? Pain is important in some religions. We are not supposed to be perfect.

Q: One of the speakers talked about disability rights. How does that relate to reproductive technology?

A: Do we have the right to say that someone with downs syndrome is less valuable? Disabled people can lead quality lives.

Q: Will this technology be used to create the perfect person?

A: We don't want to shut down technological development. But this is creepily similar to eugenics. I don't think we want to go down this road.
