POLIO ERADICATION - INDIA - DEB WENTE

Sheboygan Rotary Club Member, Deb Wente, presented a video presentation of her recent trip to India where she was part of a team of volunteers for World Polio Day. In 1988 there were 350,000 cases of Polio in 125 countries. In 2014 there were 359 cases in 3 countries. India reported more than any other country in 1988. While in India, Deb was able to attend several Rotary sponsored events. The Jaipur Foot project provides prosthetics or artificial limbs, calipers and other physical aids and appliances, free of charge, to as many disabled people as possible through its centers, outreach programs and rehabilitation camps both in India and abroad. In 2009, this invention was in the top 50 best innovations in the world. There was such a need for this invention due to all the traffic accidents that happen daily in India. Deb shared a story about a fellow Rotarian on the trip who has a prosthetic limb who was challenged to a race with a native who also had a prosthetic limb. The race was won by the native. St. Stephens Hospital, near old New Delhi, has the only polio ward in the country. It has an average of 10 beds devoted to polio patients. The hospital offers free-ofcost polio corrective surgeries to patients who come from far corners of the country. The orthopedic team at the hospital builds the braces and prosthetics in-house, which helps keep costs low. Deb's group also attended an elementary school outside Delhi. Her group never felt threatened even though there was garbage laying around and the school was not Before their group arrived a group from Canada visited the school and well kept. mentioned that the children were in desperate need of jackets. Deb's group decided to buy jackets with the Rotary logo on for all students. The biggest event this group attended was the Rotary Rally. People marched through the streets to make people aware of National Immunization Day and to remind them to get vaccinated. There were 2.5 vaccinators and 170 million children were vaccinated. The vaccine was a live vaccine and required 3 drops in the mouth. Deb was able to administer the vaccine to children. Once the children were vaccinated they were marked with a purple dot on their finger so people knew they were vaccinated. On this groups final day of their trip they went door to door doing vaccinations. Once the family was vaccinated their doors were marked in chalk. They wouldn't just go door to door though, they would look for people under tarps, walking the streets or even catch buses to make sure everyone was vaccinated.

1.2 billion dollars was given by Rotary to eradicate polio. Polio has been reduced by 99% and over 2 billion children have been immunized since 1988. A huge Thank you to Deb Wente for presenting to the club. If anyone is interested in attending a trip of a lifetime Deb has provided her contact information. You need to move fast as these trips fill up quickly.
