## <u>ROTARY YOUTH EXCHANGE STUDENT – GIULI BONZI</u>

The mission of the Rotary Youth Exchange is to foster world peace, international understanding and goodwill by extending international communication at the personal level through the exchange of students of high school age. What began in Copenhagen, Denmark the Rotary International youth exchange program has run continually since 1929, and here locally since 1970. For over forty years the Appleton Downtown Rotary has sponsored from our community student goodwill ambassadors to all parts of the globe. That is quite an achievement we all can be proud of. Annually, over 29,000 students from 78 countries around the world share their cultures with the Rotary Youth Exchange program and continue in the traditions of the RYE program. It is Rotary's hope that these young people will be able to observe, first hand, the problems and accomplishments of other countries by living with and meeting people of cultures, color and creeds other than their own. Giuli Bonzi is our RYE student we are sponsoring this school year along with Appleton Breakfast. She is currently attending Kimberly High School but she is visiting us from Resistencia Argentina. Resistencia is the capital of Chaco located in the northeastern part of Argentina. It is one of the warmest cities in Argentina reaching temperatures as high as 115-120 degrees. Resistencia is known nationally as the "city of sculptures" and "open-air museum" because of the more than 500 monuments and other works of art spread among the streets. Giuli is the youngest of 4 children and she has two older sisters and one older brother. Every Sunday they have Family day where their entire family gets together. At her local high school they have grades 8th-12th. Everyone is required to wear a uniform to create equality. Their school day consists of only a half day of school and they never leave their classroom. They have the same classmates throughout their entire school career. All of their schools are in the middle of the city which is pretty distracting. She likes how our schools are spread out so you can concentrate more on your studies. A big difference from the United States to Argentina is that we drive everywhere. In her home town they drive downtown and park and then walk to each of their destinations. Their city is a square so it's impossible to get lost. Giuli also mentioned some of her favorite foods from back home such as Empanadas and MEAT. She said they love meat back home and when they make it their entire dinner consists just of meat. One of the things she misses the most about home is the food and cooking with her brother. In closing she shared some of her favorite spots from home.



#### **CENTNENNIAL MINUTE**

Founding of Our Club - Wayne Defferding

What do the following have in common? Attorney, Train, Pittsburg, Pa, April Fools' Day

September 1914 – George H. Beckley of the Travelers Ins. Co. wrote to the International Association of Rotary Clubs to inquire about starting a club in Appleton. Nothing came of it. January 1916 – August H. Meyer of Langstad-Meyer Construction Co. wrote to the IARC also inquiring about forming a club, but nothing came of it. November 1916 – (third time's a charm!) Francis S. Bradford, a local attorney wrote to IARC saying that it was possible to form a club here in Appleton. He stated that Victor Marshall of Appleton had a good friend who had just joined the Rotary Club in Pittsburg, PA who would help form the Appleton Club. (Note: At that time a new club needed to be sponsored by an existing club. Thus Mr. Marshal's friend in the Pittsburg club was very instrumental in forming the Appleton club.) December 1916 – Mr. Bradford and Mr. Marshall rode the evening train together to Chicago and committed on that train ride to form a club. March 8, 1917 – Appleton's first Rotary Club is formed. April 1, 1917 -- The certificate of membership in International Association of Rotary Clubs is signed and issued to the new Appleton Club ---- April Fools' Day And now you know how our club started. Two More things: 6 April 1917 – U. S. Congress Declared war on the German Empire & in April 1917 – Salvation Army started in Appleton
