WISCONSIN PUBLIC BROADCASTING – 100 YEARS

In early 1917, a small group of Wisconsinites gathered at the Madison home of University of Wisconsin – Madison Physics Professor Earle Terry to witness the launch of public broadcasting in the state. Terry had been experimenting with telegraphic and telephonic broadcasts for some time, Terry wanted to give a public demonstration of telephone broadcasts using music and voice instead of Morse Code. In 1931 they found a proper home for WHA/WPR at the former heating station for campus. Radio Hall needed significant renovations and a combination of federal New Deal and university funding made the project possible. Also in the 1930's the collaboration between public broadcasting and public instruction in Wisconsin expanded when WPR launched educational School of the Air programs to serve the more than 4,000 one-room schoolhouses in the state. Programs like "Let's Sing," "Let's Draw," engaged students and saved school and the state money by providing access to free, high quality instruction that met state standards. In 1954 WAT-TV begins broadcasting and signs on with their own production, The Friendly Giant. In 1970 NPR (National Public Radio) was incorporated and PBS was created. Many other programs were created throughout the years and in 2017 they are celebrating 100 years of public broadcasting in Wisconsin.

CENTENNIAL MINUTE – WAYNE DEFFERDING

The first two years of our club 1917-1918 our club met twice a month and once a month during the summer at the YMCA and Vocational School (Rivertyme Catering). Listed below are some issues our club addressed in first two years:

1. Our club appointed a committee to arrange for the employment by farmers of school boys during their summer vacation.
2. A committee consisting of Steele, Wettengels, Weisenborn, Marshall and Ellis was appointed to interest the War Department in the location for an aviation training school on property adjacent to Lake Winnebago.
3. A motion was made for the club to extend its influence in the elimination of saloons from locations objectionable to large employers.
4. The annual meeting was held at the Randolph Hotel. Guest speaker was Charles Van Hise of the University of Wisconsin addressed the club on “The War Problem of the U.S.”
5. John Conway, Chairman of the Committee on Modern and Adequate Lighting System for the City of Appleton reported that a resolution had been drafted and presented to the City Commission.
6. A motion was made to instruct the club Secretary to write a letter to Dr. Roy Purdy, the first member of the club to enlist in War Service, to inform him that his dues have been ordered paid by the club for the ensuing year.
7. The Club endorsed the purchase of land for Pierce Park, then reversed that decision. The City put it to a referendum, which failed. The City bought the land anyway.
